### What I've Learned - Month 14

Putting up the main roof support beams this morning (Oct 9). The beams are approximately 33ft long, (about 300LBs each). So it should be a fun morning (not!). As it's the height of golf season and I'm coaching my daughter's volleyball team I haven't had much time for turning. I did finish a pear bowl that I roughed in back in Feb and created my first inlayed piece; a "his and hers" martini set including a shaker and two martini glasses. I was all wrapped around the axel about getting the wood to be perfectly smooth, but it turns out that you just need a butt load of pressure during the gluing process, who knew ;-). This was a wedding gift for one of my oldest and dearest friends. I actually got the idea while attending his bachelor party........ Glad to see I now have your full attention ;-).

Sorry, the details of the party are forever locked away in the vault where all good bachelor party stories belong. What I can share is what gave me the idea for the project. Robby (the groom) has this great walnut and maple bar in his basement. It's a completely custom job with brass accents and matching cabinets, very nice. When I saw the combination of two of my favorite woods I knew what had to be done. With only five days until the wedding I knew I had to work fast. Monday, I picked up the wood at woodcraft, cut and glued the wood for all three pieces. Tuesday, I finished the shaker and applied the first coat of salad bowl finish. Wednesday, finished the first glass and put coats of salad bowl finish on both pieces. Thursday, turned the 2<sup>nd</sup> glass and coated all three. Friday morning. I put what ended up to be the final coats and buffed all three before leaving for the wedding Saturday morning. Whew, with zero margin for error I got lucky, but it wasn't perfect. If I had a couple more days I would have worked on the 2<sup>nd</sup> glass a little longer as the shape wasn't exactly right and the finish needed more coats for durability and shine, but all in all, the end result was STILL the coolest thing I've created to-date.

As a final note for this month I would like to give a special shout out to my man Chet Olson web master extraordinaire. 


### Advice from The Arborist



This month thought it would be nice to stray momentarily from wood and talk about another handy topic - knots. I use several different types of knots on a daily basis. I'm including a few of my favorites here and hope that you will find the time to practice them. I welcome ideas for future articles or questions regarding this one. jeremywbaker@gmail.com


#### My favorite knots



Bowline - this is an all-around handy knot. It's my standby.




Running bowline - just a slight variation of the standard bowline here to create a nice 'slip-knot'.



Butterfly knot - this one is great for creating an attachment point midline.




Clove hitch - nice termination hitch that doesn't slip and is easy to break when you need to untie.



**Double fisherman's knot** – this one is great to create a loop out of a single piece of line; can be untied with relative ease.



**Sheet bend** – Excellent for attaching two lines together, but works best when connecting lines of differing diameters.



**Trucker's hitch** – very useful when tightening a line over a load and easily pulls loose after you're finished If you tie it correctly.



**Square knot** – the first knot I ever learned to tie...right over left and under; left over right and under.

I hope you enjoy this. Remember to always use the appropriate safety equipment while working. Keep your eyes, ears, and hands safe. Safety equipment is replaceable – you are not!

#### Woodturning - A Foundation Course by Keith Rowley, published in 1999

This book contains a complete introduction to all aspects of wood turning, with a breadth and depth that might well offer something for more experienced turners as well as beginning turners, although the primary audience for the book is beginning turners. Each topic is carefully illustrated with colour photographs (the book is published in the UK;-) and line drawings where appropriate.

The author elaborates on what we've often heard as the "ABCs for turning", Anchor, Bevel, Cut) with the Laws of Woodturning, of which he cites six laws in Chapter 5 and refers to them in several places in the book. (1) The speed of the lathe must be compatible with the size, weight, and length of wood to be turned, (2) The tool must be on the rest before the whirling timber is engaged, and must remain so whenever the tool is in contact with the wood, (3) The bevel of the cutting tools must rub the wood behind the cut, (4) The only part of the tool that should be in contact with the wood is that part of the tool that is receiving direct support from the toolrest, (5) Always cut "downhill" or with the grain, (6) Scrapers must be kept perfectly flat (in section) on the toolrest and presented in the "trailing mode", i.e. with the tool handle higher than the tool edge.

The section on sharpening has some good information but is perhaps a bit incomplete, given the publication date, as it does not mention any of the current sharpening jigs, but it does include a description of a homemade grinding jug (platform), but he does include a good discussion of the various angles he believes are the best ones for various tools.

There are detailed chapters for each of the following topics:

- 1. Turning between Centers, which including basic hollowing, and projects for a goblet, and wooden fruit.
- 2. Faceplate turning including projects for first bowl that contains great detailed photos, and a platter
- 3. Copy Turning, which includes a lot of good information about how to produce duplicate pieces, and it includes projects for a bar stool, staircase baluster, and a plinth (again, showing the UK influence). A plinth is a base, and the book shows an approach for a template that makes it easier to duplicate an ogee or other shape on a round base turning.
- 4. Sanding and Finishing, which includes drawings for a DIY sanding disk attachment for the lathe, including baseboard for a miter gage

Boring and Routing on the Lathe, including numerous jigs and projects for an inlaid nut bowl, twig pot, pepper mill, and table lamp and a pen.

Many of the other books I've looked at or acquired over the years only cover some of these topics, such as just turning bowls or possibly just doing work between centers. I think it's a book with a lot of helpful information for a range of turning skills and experience and I would be glad to loan my copy and perhaps we can add the companion DVD to the CAT library at some point. I've found it to be helpful because of the careful attention to detail in the various descriptions, and the quality and quantity of drawings and photos.
